

deals with a number of techniques of healing still excluded for a variety of reasons from the medical 'establishment' in this country—techniques like herbalism, naturopathy, allopathy, acupuncture, psychotherapy, spiritual healing and homoeopathy, amongst others. The book is not simply a survey of these methods of treatment; it is also a sharp attack on what the author regards as the narrow outlook of orthodox medicine in Britain, and the main aim of his argument is to bring some light and air to a subject that is complicated by all kinds of taboos, prejudices and conventions. *Fringe Medicine* is a very good piece of polemical writing: it is vigorous, enthusiastic and it has humour. You may disagree with almost all of its opinions, but you will undoubtedly enjoy the argument immensely.
